

To re-program \$626,929.04 in Community Development Block Grant Coronavirus funds (CDBG-CV) from three previously funded projects that are now defunct with unspent balances to the JD Clifton Park Improvement project. The projects with unspent funding balances include The Small Business Stabilization Fund Program (\$110,000), The Lake Charles Memorial Mental Health Program (\$293,810.78), and Project Build A Future Mortgage/Rental Assistance Program (\$223,118.26). Featured improvements for the park will include installation of a putting green, adding a botanical garden, creation of walking trails, and installation of an open pavilion. In addition, two vacant and blighted structures will be demolished. This project will provide suitable open space for activities to encourage physical distancing and support social distancing.

1. Introduction

The Consolidated Plan serves as a planning document meeting the federal government statutory requirements in 24 CFR 91.200-91.230, with revisions for preparing a Consolidated Plan and guiding the use of CDBG, HOME, HOPWA, and ESG funding based on applications to the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD). The major sections of the Consolidated Plan include a Housing Market Analysis, Housing and Homeless Needs Assessment, 5-year Strategic Plan, a 1-year Action Plan, Consultation and Citizen Participation, with accompanying documentation relating to public comment. The Strategic Plan addresses specific needs that were identified in the data analysis, with specific goals and program targets for each category designated for funding. The Action Plan is a subset of the Strategic Plan.

The City's proposed allocation for FY 2019 consists of a total of \$ 981,953 with an additional \$ 165,157 in Program Income and \$1,005,428 in CDBG-CV funds.

This Action Plan contains a range of goals, objectives, and outcomes formulated to address needs identified for homelessness, other special needs, affordable housing, non-housing community development, barriers to affordable housing, lead-based paint hazards, institutional structure, and coordination. These objectives include:

- Continue to collaborate with homeless providers to supply a continuum of services
- Support services aimed at the prevention and elimination of homelessness and Rapid rehousing
- Improve the condition of housing for low-income homeowners
- Increase the viability of potential homeownership opportunities
- Improve the condition of housing for low-income renters and homeowners through relocation services
- Support improvement of infrastructure and public facilities in CDBG targeted areas of Lake Charles
- Removal of Slum and Blight Conditions
- Address community needs through community-based public service programs

These goals are supported by a collection of associated objectives and performance goals. These objectives seek to work toward meeting the goals stated, addressing the need for more affordable housing, housing rehabilitation, public facilities, infrastructure improvements, and social services.

3. Evaluation of past performance

This is an evaluation of past performance that helped lead the grantee to choose its goals or projects.

The City of Lake Charles has a history of successful programs funded through the Community Development Block Grant and HOME Investment Partnership Program. Of particular importance to the health of the city have been programs that address the condition of the housing stock. The City has successfully funded Homeowner Rehabilitation activities targeting lower income and elderly households unable to properly maintain their homes. The City also operates a successful program that provides Homebuyer Assistance to new homebuyers. The City is working to remove the dilapidated housing stock in the CDBG eligible areas through demolition and major rehabilitation programs. Details of past performance can be found in the City's Consolidated Annual Performance and Evaluation Report (CAPER).

During the 2017-2018 fiscal year, the New Orleans Field Office monitored the City of Lake Charles' Community Development Division, there were Findings and Concerns that the City must address.

FINDING NO: RM17002: PJ Committed to CHDO Funds to a Project that is not Eligible CHDO Activity.

FINDING NO: RM17001: Less Than one-third of Board Members Represent low-income community.

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FINDING NO: RM17003: PJ Failed to inspect HOME rental units during affordability period.

Concern No. 1: The PJ needs to improve its management of CHDOs

In 2018, the City of Lake Charles forwarded all required documents to the field office. HUD has stated that the city of Lake Charles has met all required actions, and is in compliance with all of our findings and concerns.

The City of Lake Charles works with a wide variety of agencies, organizations, and service providers in an effort to bring various viewpoints to be in the identification of local housing and service needs. Ongoing relationships focused on specific needs and targeted meetings designed to bring public input into the Action Plan process are two of the ways that the City utilizes outside organizations in the consultation process.

The City has ongoing relationships with housing providers (CHDOs) working on housing development activities. The CHDO system provides a forum for assisting these agencies to grow and meet their targeted clientele. The City works closely with the Housing Authority of Lake Charles which organizes resources from the federal government to address the housing needs of the City's lowest income households. The City participates in a variety of other coalitions that seek to address other issues that relate to housing and service needs.

City staff works actively with the Southwest Louisiana Balance of State, the local umbrella for the development of the Continuum of Care. Staff participates in regularly scheduled meetings and point-in-time surveys. In the past, the City has often brought CDBG resources to the table to supplement Continuum of Care initiatives and distributes CDBG funding to the various agencies that make up the membership of the continuum.

Home match will be provided from the City's General funds with the exception of Administrative fees (100% federal). (12.5% of HOME project expenditures). The City has also accumulated Program Income from the HOME program in the amount of \$ 165,157 and \$1,005,428 in CDBG-CV funds to respond to the effects of the Coronavirus pandemic.

The City was allocated \$981,953 from the CDBG and HOME programs for the 2019 Program Year. These funds will be used to operate a range of private and public services as described later in the Annual Action Plan. The City has obtained Program income from the Home funds that will be used for the Major Home Rehabilitation program. The City has also accumulated Program Income from the HOME program in the amount of \$ 165,157. Lastly, the City is receiving \$1,005,428 in CDBG-CV funds to respond to the effects of the Coronavirus pandemic.

Reaching out to homeless persons (especially unsheltered persons) and assessing their individual needs

The SWLA Balance of State, the coalition of local homeless service agencies, conducts annual surveys of homeless individuals, including unsheltered persons. These surveys serve to help focus agency activities for the coming year, as well as provide documentation in response to HUD's program requirements. Also, Lake Charles City Police has created a record of where the homeless population lives within the city limits of Lake Charles.

Addressing the emergency shelter and transitional housing needs of homeless persons

Homeless providers are focusing efforts on increasing the bed count for both emergency shelter and transitional housing programs. Funding for these efforts has been limited.

Helping homeless persons (especially chronically homeless individuals and families, families with children, veterans and their families, and unaccompanied youth) make the transition to permanent housing and independent living, including shortening the period of time that individuals and families experience homelessness, facilitating access for homeless individuals and families to affordable housing units, and preventing individuals and families who were recently homeless from becoming homeless again

The Emergency Solutions Program includes activities targeting improvements in the areas of Rapid Re-Housing and Homeless Prevention. The Parish has taken over this program. The City of Lake Charles will be working with them on all endeavors.

Helping low-income individuals and families avoid becoming homeless, especially extremely low-income individuals and families and those who are: being discharged from publicly funded institutions and systems of care (such as health care facilities, mental health facilities, foster care and other youth facilities, and corrections programs and institutions); or, receiving assistance from public or private agencies that address housing, health, social services, employment, education, or youth needs.

Homeless prevention is a major focus of the participants in the Southwest Louisiana Balance of State.

Agencies include homeless prevention as a support program in conjunction with the provision of shelter and other support services. The City has facilitated the ESG program for over twenty years, but now the Parish will be conducting this program because they are able to reach those outside of the city limits, which we were limited to.

Discussion

The participants in the Southwest Louisiana Balance of State work closely together to meet the needs of homeless individuals and families through the continuum of care by partnering with different agencies. The City is a member of the board and participates in the planning process.

The City provides homebuyer assistance to families who are purchasing a home for the first time. These families are low/moderate income. Also, the City provides Major Home Rehabilitation to those who are low to moderate income and qualify for assistance. We, the City, partner with our local CHDO to provide construction of new homes that are sold to persons who are low/moderate income.

Actions planned to reduce lead-based paint hazards

1. Continue to meet HUD lead-based paint abatement standards in housing rehabilitation programs.

2. Identify additional funding to perform abatement on pre-1978 housing in the target census.

3. Seek funding as it becomes available to provide testing and abatement of lead-based paint hazards in single-family housing where young children are present.

4. Expand the stock of lead safe housing units through housing initiatives.

5. Seek funding as it becomes available to provide for testing, abatement, training and educational awareness.

Actions planned to reduce the number of poverty-level families

The City will continue its efforts, in conjunction with the SWLA Balance of State Continuum of Care and the Housing Authority of Lake Charles, to reduce the number of poverty-level families through the development of services such as educational opportunities, job growth and life skills training. This will be achieved through the various social service agencies operating in the city.

Actions planned to develop institutional structure

1. Work with non-profit organizations to address community needs and provide support to federal and

Annual Action Plan 2019 non-federal funding initiatives.

- 2. Work with private industry to address important issues that hamper housing and community development efforts.
- 3. Identify opportunities to create private/public partnerships for project finance and development to leverage federal funds.
